# Looking forward to Spring!

With the festive season behind us, thoughts turn to our plans for next year on our plots and in our gardens. As we plan what to sow and where to grow it, effective pest control without the use of chemicals, is becoming more important.

One pest relatively new to the plots is the leek miner, the reddish brown larva of the leek fly, first detected in the UK in 2002 and moving north as the climate warms. A quick check on the RHS website confirms the only way to deal with it is prevention. Firstly, by covering leeks onions and garlic in insect proof mesh during the peak flying times March and April and September to November, Secondly practice crop rotation to prevent any pupae that have survived the winter getting into the next crop if planted in the same place. Experience on the plots has confirmed this with leek miner present in many crops, apart from one grown under mesh.

Not all pests can be controlled in this way, so the Society is discussing the best way of chemical free gardening at January's AGM. The suggestion is a hierarchy of pest control from taking a relaxed approach accepting nature's feeding or disease is acceptable in most cases, careful husbandry, inspecting plants and manually removing pests where

possible, and as a last resort the safe use of chemicals. One definite proposal is to ban the use of Glyphosate based weedkillers as it is so harmful to pollinators. If you want to see more details, the full document is on the Society website www.bartonallotments.org.uk

January is often called the hungry gap, but if you have planned well last year there should be plenty to harvest - Jerusalem artichokes, sprouts, broccoli, winter cabbage, kale and, of course, leeks. January is often thought to be too early to start sowing, but in an unheated green house or cold frame you can start onion and shallots sets, and sow broad beans, early carrots, yet more leeks and lettuce. If you don't have a purpose made cold frame one of those covered propagators you can get from most gardening shops is a

good substitute.

When sowing broad especially if you have saved the seed from the previous harvest as many gardeners do, check for signs of the bean weevil before you sow. If there are small holes in the seed, as in the photograph, then it has hatched out over winter. Some reckon that these seeds will usually germinate but if you want to be sure of a good crop, just sow good seed. I might try sowing holed ones as an experiment

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Dam Road Park renewal

Friends of Barton Parks (FoBP) has focussed on upgrading Dam Road Park during 2024 and although there is still work to do the results are being welcomed by park users.

# New Growth in Baysgarth Park

Thanks to the generosity of Barton residents a Crowdfunding Appeal to raise money for trees easily met its target.



In November Friends of Barton Parks put out a call for help to raise funds to replace a weeping willow tree in the Chad Varah Garden that had been vandalised and two oak trees in the Redoubt Copse to replace dead/ damaged trees.

Planted by volunteers, led by Andrew Robinson in 2016 after a fundraising effort from the late Laurie Robinson, these 17 trees are listed on the Imperial War Museum's website as War Memorial 88565. The trees commemorate the loss of 17 Barton men on October 13, 1915, when the charge was made on the Hohenzollen Redoubt, near Loos, France. Each tree has on its supporting post a small name plate, showing name, rank and number. Unfortunately, some of these name plates have been lost. The fundraising target was exceeded and the Friends can now afford to replace the missing name plates as well as the trees.

Mark Nettleton and his team installed carefully selected new trees in December. Although we had many offers of small trees from people who had grown them in local gardens these were purchased from a tree nursery and selected for their height to make sure they didn't look out of place with the rest of the group. The updated name plates will be installed on new posts in the New Year



# A new chapter for Baysgarth House

Several stunning Georgian house will open again in 2025.

The lead on this redevelopment is The Ropewalk, a registered charity in Barton-upon-Humber. For 25 years The Ropewalk has successfully run an arts centre, museum, café and studio spaces in a heritage building towards the north of the town. The Ropewalk took out a lease from North Lincolnshire Council for the site in October last year and has secured £850,000 of capital funding for the development work. Funding from The Community Ownership Fund, UK Shared Prosperity Fund, North Lincolnshire Council and Barton Town Council will be used to comprehensively repair the fabric of the building to make it safe for public use. Baysgarth is also the Co-op Good Cause for 2025 until

organisations and private individuals have already pledged sponsorship amounts and we are very grateful that they have come forward so quickly without prompting. In 2025 we will be advertising sponsorship opportunities whether you would like to make a donation towards a drainage grid, a window, a cast iron bollard or a toilet seat we will be open to any and every offer of

But Baysgarth House needs more than remedial work to fulfil its potential, and an ambitious vision for the site's use as a set of community spaces, leisure facility and museum has been developed. Baysgarth House will need to earn income to be sustainable in the same way that The Ropewalk operates on 90% earned income and 10% public funding which is why the establishment of a

tea room has been a priority. The development work will be undertaken in a series of phases. Phase One received planning permission and listed building consent on December 13. There is a lot of work to do in a short space of time as funding conditions have tight deadlines as we aim to refurbish, refocus, and ensure sustainable running of one of Barton-upon-Humber's most prominent heritage

- Developing the stable block into a tea room with accessible toilet and a display on the history of Hopper
- Repurpose the old ladies toilets and store that has a door into the park as an ice cream kiosk to be open during the spring and
- Renovating the lodge buildings ready for storage and the volunteer gardeners' store.
- Installing an accessible toilet and kitchen area in the cottage ready to host workshops.

Phase Two will follow in summer 2025 including:

- Renovation of the two ground floor exhibition rooms
- Installing an accessible toilet. Renovating an upstairs room to
- create an archive room • Renovation of the ground floor corridor to include a history of the house and park
- A museum shop
- · Renovated office space.
- Ground Source Heat Pump to service the whole site.

Depending on future funding Phase Three will concentrate on a large display about the history of Barton following consultation and visioning work with local groups and volunteers and the installation of a lift to the first floor making the majority of the house accessible to

This is more a marathon than a sprint and we don't want Barton residents to expect everything will be done at once. We will keep you informed about each stage on our Facebook page and through open days, focus groups and the pages of the Bartonian. We hope that we will be welcoming you all in



As can be seen from the Hopper Catalogue, F. Hopper & Co Ltd from Barton on Humber produced the "cyclette" and sold the machine for a price of £2 4ss and 6d for the semi solid tyre model or £2 4s 6d for the model with pneumatic tyres that also included a pump and clips! Application for the award is voluntary, but it is important to achieve, because it means that after careful scrutiny of up to three years, The Arts Council will assess if the organisation is being properly managed, its collections cared for and accessible and the needs of present and future generations are properly considered. Bartonian, Ted Lewis, the Father of British

Noir, changed how many films were made and crime novels written. His graphic art was so nationally recognised, he was head hunted to manage ground breaking animation of the Beatles Yellow Submarine. In his spare time he was a talented jazz pianist. However, his reputation was customarily formally neglected in his home town until Barton Arts featured full readings of his novels. The Rabbit and Get Carter in the Old Mill during successive festival

In 2013, The Ted Lewis Group was formed, consisting of a dedicated number of volunteers. Exhibitions were mounted, a two-day Barton Jazz Festival promoted. and the original biography of the novelist written by 2015. Lewis studied art for four years in Hull, hence the Group's three-week exhibition spearheaded four Hull City promoted features, the biography went into its second edition and another, more comprehensive biography, encouraged by the Group appeared. Only one of Ted's novels had been available, so the group encouraged fresh editions, albeit by an American Publisher.

The 50th anniversary of Ted Lewis's Get The Ted Lewis Centre Carter being made was in 2020, the year Ted

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
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Although privately owned since 1557 the current house mostly dates from the 17th Century and is a Grade II\* listed building. The first known owner is known to be Thomas Glentham. However, the most noted inhabitants to have lived here are the Nelthorpe family who owned the house between 1620 and 1792.

After the Nelthorpes the house changed hands frequently, in 1889 Baysgarth was sold to Robert Wright Taylor and in 1930 was gifted to Barton upon Humber Urban District Council by his daughter Mrs Clare Ramsden.

Barbara was a beautiful, kind, educated, positive, strong, independent, well dressed and spoken lady - she was our QUEEN. The heart and soul of the family. Her glass was always half full.



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




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
